02-602 Professional Issues in Computational Biology Fall 2017

Required Foundation Course for First Year MSCB students

Location: Thursdays, 4.30-5.20pm, GHC 4301

Description: This course gives Master's in Computational Biology students an opportunity to develop the professional skills necessary for a successful career in computational biology. This two-semester required course will include assistance with elevator pitches, interview preparation, resume and cover letter writing, networking, and presentation skills. This course will also include opportunities to connect with computational biology professionals and academic researchers. This course will meet once a week and is pass/fail only. The grading scheme will be discussed on the first day of class.

Course expectations: To receive a passing grade, you must fulfill the following requirements:

- 1. You can miss or be tardy to no more than two classes total per semester (attendance will be taken at the beginning of class). If you will be missing class, you must email the instructors before class explaining your reason for not being able to attend.
- 2. You must complete the assignments in the course, which include but are not limited to giving an elevator pitch, writing a resume, crafting cover letters, completing mock interviews, and delivering a short presentation on a technical topic.
- 3. You must submit a 1-page "Reflection Statement" before the final day of class.
